LETTER FROM FATHER

THE FIVE FRUIT HARVESTED DURING THE 40 DAYS AFTER PASCHA

hrist is Risen! We know something extraordinary has just taken place and we find ourselves filled with gratitude, joy, and love. Elated, blessed, and resurrected, we leave Pascha and enter back into the world not quite sure how long the spiritual disciplines we have adopted and the spiritual progress we have made will last. Am I different at all? We are the building project of God. Year after year, we humbly submit ourselves to instruction and

place our lives in the hands of God. We know that God is our Life and it takes a life-time of desiring to make Him our Life – this is the holy work Christians are called to engage. The purpose of Great Lent and Holy Week is the renewal of our life in Christ. Holy Week is meant to ignite the spark planted through our baptisms and show us what it is like to walk daily in the Grace

and love of Christ given to us through His death and resurrection. Holy Week is a founding action for the City of God. We are now made faithful members of the New Jerusalem, the Kingdom of God – His holy Church on earth. Making Christ our King again, and coming to understand sin as an enemy that seeks to block our passage into that Kingdom, is the purpose of Holy Week.

For the next 40 days we find ourselves renewed and celebrating the rebirth of our faith given to us in Christ. The reason we have spent a great deal of energy cultivating virtue and learning from our mistakes is so that we may live more fully in the Spirit of God. Now that the *work* of Christ on earth has come to completion, His very last promise was that His Holy Spirit would make its entrance into history in order to begin the work of the Church. The role and mission of the Holy Spirit in our lives is laid out before us through the six weeks between Pascha and Pentecost. This is how, as citizens of the Kingdom of God, the New Jerusalem, His Holy Church, we are called to live.

<u>The First Harvested Fruit of Pascha</u> <u>Making New Disciples</u>

The harvest of faith is producing new disciples by sharing the *Good News* with them. The experience of having seen the risen Christ leads Thomas to engage in the work of the Church; to go and baptize all nations in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We have seen and we have believed so that we may become the eyes of

faith for those who need "proof" of the resurrection of Christ.

- Can we each find one person to share the Good News of what we have just experienced with the prayer of them becoming the next new member of the body of Christ?
- To whom can I become the eyes of faith?
- Our Lord often brings new people who seek to join the Orthodox Church. When you see someone new on Sundays, reach out and welcome them; they may need a godparent and that might be you.

<u>The Second Harvested Fruit of Pascha</u> <u>The Courageous Ministry of Women</u>

The role of women in spreading the gospel becomes foundational for the life of the Church. The myrrh-bearing women become *apostles* to the apostles since they are the first to discover the empty tomb These women. motivated by their deep love for Christ, seek to anoint His beaten and bloodied dead body. They have no hesitation, seeking nothing from Christ other than to care for Him. The ministry of

servitude out of our love for Christ, whether it is an emotional, physical, or spiritual need, is championed by women; however, it is for everyone to participate. We are called to reach out to those who are suffering loss, illness, depression, loneliness, and death as if they are Christ Himself.

- Pay attention to those around you who are suffering and seek the courage to assist them.
- Pray to know what keeps us from loving Christ fully.
- Ask yourself, "Who is God calling me to serve?"

The Third Harvested Fruit of Pascha Becoming A Human Being

On the Sunday of the Paralytic, we hear "I have no human being" – Christ, the new Adam, and perfect human being frees him from his peril of lying in wait for 38 years. Mother Teresa wrote: "The biggest disease today is

not cancer or tuberculosis, but rather the feeling of being unwanted, uncared for, and deserted by everybody. The greatest evil is the lack of love and charity, the terrible indifference towards one's neighbor who lives at the roadside, the victim of exploitation, corruption, poverty, and disease." Orthodox Christians have just experienced in Holy Week how Christ Himself was indeed deserted by everyone and identifies Himself with all those who have experienced such trauma.

As renewed Christians, we become

the ones who are called to care for and show concern towards those who have no person in their lives. In the liturgy, we are called to become *for* Christ in the world – His hands, His heart, His eyes, His ears – and to serve those in need. "For You, Lord, are the helper of the helpless, the hope of the hopeless, the savior of the afflicted, the haven of the voyager, and the physician of the sick." (Liturgy of St. Basil)

- How aware are we of the feelings of those closest to us?
- Some people act in unfamiliar and peculiar ways around us and find it difficult to 'fit in' – Christ's love in us moves us to receive them.
- How can we bring the love, care, and concern of Christ to those whom the world ignores?

<u>The Fourth Harvested Fruit of Pascha</u> <u>Satisfying the Thirst for Truth in Others</u>

The love of Christ is expressed towards the Samaritan woman (St. Photini) as His thirst and desire for all to be saved and come to the

knowledge of the truth. As renewed Christians filled with the joy and peace of Christ and having tasted at Pascha the radiance of the *New Jerusalem*, we want to share what we have received with everyone, especially those who may be spiritually blind and without a home. Evangelism is the mission of the Church and the desire to engage in it is continuously being fed through our participation in worship, so that we can conduct the *liturgy after the liturgy* in the world.

- Participating in worship in Spirit and Truth empowers the faithful to have a mind for evangelism. New spiritual disciplines established during Great Lent are vital to meaningful worship.
- Religion consists of blindly submitting oneself to various rules and regulations as ends in themselves. Christianity is practicing a living relationship with the person of Jesus Christ – the living God.

The Fifth Harvested Fruit of Pascha Humanity Receives Sight Again

The man born blind is healed by Christ (John 9) by taking earth and mixing His divine powers in His spittle. He re-creates the eyes of the man without sight. This is an image of God's final act of the re-creation of the human being in Christ. We have received illumination through Christ in our sharing in His death and resurrection. It is possible to know God, to see Him as He works in our own lives and in the lives of others. We have been given new spiritual insight that allows us to know God and shine His brilliance as renewed members of His Kingdom who humble themselves in service towards others.

CULTIVATING THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT

When we moved into our house, our backyard was entirely covered in rocks. In fact, it probably was more of a quarry than a yard, but we saw a bunch of potential for what we could do. I mean, we're talking rocks, not just pebbles. **Rocks.**

Over the course of several back breaking months and with the help of a couple friends, we shoveled at least a couple tons worth of these little monsters into four enormous piles, clearing the ground for the possibility of laying sod in an attempt to beautify the space and provide room for our kids to play.

We also planted a few trees and built a raised garden bed because we loved the idea of growing our own food and enjoying the literal fruit of our labor.

I'll never forget the joy that came from tasting that first peach, a peach that we grew ourselves... well, with God's help.

Of course, keeping a garden is a really difficult thing to do. You need to know the health of the soil, keep an eye on how much sun a plant gets, and ensure that it gets just the right amount of water; nothing is more demoralizing than enthusiastically over watering a plant.

But the whole point of tending the garden is to ensure that the plant is healthy, that it is given exactly the right conditions in which growing fruit is just what it does. Gardening is about cultivating a *plant*; fruit is the byproduct.

Fruit is just what a healthy plant naturally produces.

As we consider this post-paschal season and the new life of the Spirit given to us at Pentecost, we are likewise invited to consider what it means to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit in our own lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self control (Gal. 5:22-23).

This fruit of the Spirit, if we follow the metaphor, is intended to be the natural product of a life that is lived in Christ, a life that is filled with the Spirit of God.

As exciting as it is to find a peach here or an apple there, if fruit trees only yield the occasional yummy treat, we'd probably be concerned, wondering what is preventing the tree from being *fruitful*.

So, too, we must stay vigilant in attending to the garden of our own hearts. While the occasional act of love or moment of joy is certainly something to celebrate (just like that first peach!), We need to ask ourselves whether these fruit have emerged as a momentary mercy or whether they're the result of continually bathing in the light of God's grace and being filled with His own Life.

The point of cultivating the fruit of the spirit is not simply that we occasionally do loving, joyful, peaceful, patient, kind, generous, faithful, gentle, and self-controlled **things**, but rather that we actually *become* loving, joyful, peaceful,

patient, kind, generous, faithful, gentle, and self-controlled **people**.

It is about making sure we become *a certain kind of person*, the kind of person from whom the fruit of the Spirit naturally shows forth.

The Lord did not give us the Holy Spirit so that we would occasionally do things that were in keeping with His character, but rather, He gave us the Spirit so that we might experience a total transformation of our own character.

It's a transformation into His own character, so that we might become a new kind of human.

A human in whom the Spirit fully dwells so that our very lives are fruitful, so that we become people for whom love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control are simply the way we are in the world.

The Christian life is not *just* about growing fruit; it's about becoming a new plant.

It is about finding ourselves grafted into the Tree of Life, the Tree that is Christ so that we become natural outpourings of His own Life, His own Love, His own Joy, His own Peace, His own Patience, His own Kindness, His own Generosity, His own Faithfulness, His own Gentleness, and His own Self-control.

So as we leave Pascha behind, let's see this as an invitation to let

Christ's newness of Life dwell fully in us as it is activated by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit which we, like the apostles (!), receive at Pentecost. Let us continue to abide deeply in Love Himself, the One who gave us His own Spirit so that we ourselves might *become* Love.

Anastázius Kaejatídarján Music Director, Byzantine Chanting

As you have witnessed the last couple of months Anastázius Kaejatídarján, Cantor/Psaltis, is now our new Music Director at Assumption. He is responsible for all music and service booklets we find at the Narthex for us to use for our services. He composes new music and teaches the psaltic tradition to others who are interested in learning and be part of the team for church services. He is currently focused on reorganizing liturgical materials in a way that the parishioners can use. Anastázius has a zeal in teaching our young children, and is on the First Fridays team, with lessons resuming after Pascha. On a regular basis, he holds training for chant team members where he teaches them the traditions. to promote understanding and learning of the hymns of the Orthodox Church.

As Anastázius explains "for every prayer service of the church, I study the liturgical books — the monthly Menaia, the Triodion, Pentecostarion, Horologion, Octoëchos. Typikon, and Imerologion — to determine the order of the service. Then, considering what translations and music are available, I write and publish a text, adding musical information where possible. In English, a large majority of the hymns lack musical compositions. Among the few that have compositions, often the translations are unpreferable. Given adequate time, it is better to create new music than to improvise. All of our music uses psaltic notation. Although it is greatly preferable for those in the choir to know the psaltic notation, I am gradually adapting some of the music into western notation, as we have already done with the music of Sunday liturgy and some of Lenten compunctionate vespers. I intend next, to adapt the resurrection hymns of Orthros."

Endowment Fund Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is an endowment fund?

An endowment fund is a long-term fund invested for the future needs of an organization. The way an endowment fund works is that the principal amount of the gift will be invested in to yield growth while protecting principle. Only the income will be used for suitable endeavors. An endowment governed to a specific purpose, the framework of the lead donor, this endowment at Assumption will prioritize scholarships to students in need in addition to meaningful community (evangelism) projects that share Christ's love.

Who can contribute to an endowment fund?

Anyone can contribute towards the endowment fund. An investment in an endowment plan is eligible for a tax deduction. Required IRA distributions can be contributed to Assumption and allocated to the endowment fund. This is a good choice for individuals looking to save money on their taxes. Additionally, Assumption can be named as a beneficiary in a trust or will with the proceeds allocated to the endowment fund or any of Assumption's projects.

How does an endowment benefit Assumption?

The most important benefits of an endowment include:

- · Reinforcing Assumption's commitment to serving our community for years to come.
- · Receiving a steady revenue source, thereby helping Assumption weather the ups and downs of other funding sources for the specific purpose stated above.
- Raising Assumption's credibility by conveying stability, fiscal responsibility and prudent planning. This can attract donors seeking to direct their gifts.
- · Our hope is to grow the endowment fund so that in ten or twenty years it has reached a critical mass that the income alone is an overwhelming force of good for sharing the Holy Spirit with our own parishioners and those in our extended community.

"We know already that the un-vesting of the catechumen before Baptism signified the rejection by him of the old man and the "old life, that of sin and corruption. It is indeed sin that revealed their nakedness to Adam and Eve and made them conceal it with vestments. But why were they not ashamed of their nakedness before sin? Because they were vested in divine glory and light, in the ineffable beauty which is the true nature of man. It is this first garment that they lost, and they knew that they were naked (Gen. 3:7). But then the post-baptismal vesting in the robe of light signifies above all the return of man to the integrity and innocence he had in Paradise, the recovery by him of his true nature obscured and mutilated by sin. St. Ambrose compares the baptismal robe to the vestments of Christ on Mount Tabor. The Transfigured Christ reveals perfect and sinless humanity as not naked but vested in garments white like snow, in the uncreated light of divine glory. It is Paradise, not sin that reveals the true nature of man: it is to Paradise and to his true nature. to his primordial vestment of glory that man returns in Baptism." - Fr. Schmemann

- In Chrismation we are anointed with holy Chrism.
- Chrism is made of various fragrant essences oils (57) mixed together and sanctified by our Patriarch when needed on Holy Thursday.
- ✤ It conveys the Holy Spirit as a Gift upon Catechumens and replaced the laying on of hands practice in the Orthodox Church as recorded in Acts 8.

- Chrism is also used to consecrate Church Altars and Buildings.
- ✤ The action of being vested and anointed with holy Chrism reveals three fundamental dimensions of man's <u>new</u> and high calling in Christ – the royal, the priestly, and the prophetic.

"Baptized into Christ, having put on Christ, he is ready to receive the Holy Spirit, the very Spirit of Christ, the very gifts of Christ the Anointed – the King, the Priest and the Prophet – the foundational content of all genuine Christian life, of all Christian spirituality."

- Fr. Schmemann (Of Water and the Spirit)

- ✤ The reason the formula for anointing is singular – the "gift of the Holy Spirit" is because, "the radical uniqueness of this sacrament is that it bestows in man not any particular gift or gifts of the Holy Spirit, but the Holy Spirit Himself as gift. (*Fr. Schmemann*)
- Chrismation makes us *Christs* in Christ, by anointing us with the *ointment (Chrism)* of the Holy Spirit it opens to humanity the door to union with God or theosis.
- ♥ Receive the "seal" of the gift of the Holy Spirit
 - It is the imprint on us of the One Who owns us; it is the sign of our high and unique calling.
 - In Christ, the true and unique Temple, we become the **temple** of the Holy Spirit.
 - In Christ, who is the King, the Priest and the Prophet, we are made kings, priests and prophets.



ALL SAINTS CAMP AND ITS LASTING IMPACT

elcome back, All Saints Camp! You may have seen the countless flyers and heard the many announcements, or perhaps even donated to this ministry in the past, but if you have never been to camp, here's a look into how our program runs.

ASC will return for another year of fun, faith, and fulfillment in the mountains of Prescott. Arizona. from May 30 to June 3, 2023. This pan-Orthodox ministry hosts campers from all throughout Arizona, for children going into the 3rd grade through those who have just graduated high school. Run by a seasoned management team and an enthusiastic and well-trained staff, this has been an impactful ministry in the Valley for over 38 years. The staff is filled with young adults who have been trained at camps such as Ionian Village in Greece, the Metropolis of San Fransisco Summer Camp, Camp Angelos in Portland, Camp Saint Paul of the DOD, and more! Many of this year's counselors are Assumption members and have even been campers themselves.

This year's theme is *Apologia*, taken from the words of St. Peter's letter to the church (1 Peter 3:15), where he told Christians to be ready to make their defense (apologia) of their faith in Christ. In a world where it may be difficult for our campers to maintain their faith, and in places where people might try to take it from them, we want them to better understand their faith and feel confident enough to defend it and share it with the world.

Another wonderful thing to note is that ASC is "unplugged", as campers are provided the opportunity to leave their phones and such

behind to move through the week untethered. As parents and grandparents, it may not be lost on you that many of our children are bombarded and overwhelmed with all of the technology and stresses in their daily lives. All Saints Camp, although only a week, allows the youth to recenter themselves, refocus on Christ, and create and strengthen their relationships with other young Orthodox Christians.

As Fr. Jacob has noted before, ASC is focused on prayer: it's a camp where we "pray, and then pray some more, and then after breakfast we pray again, only to learn more prayers" and so on. The proof is in the pudding, well evidenced by the high attendance rate and the return campers. When we put Christ first, things seem to fall into place. Of course, there is no shortage of fun to be had! This year's campsite has a rock wall, ropes course, and even a zip line and there are many other fun activities to enjoy as well, like hiking, large group games, arts and crafts, and more!

Camp consists of a daily schedule, part of which is filled with our five program sessions:


- Orthodox Life (OL) led by our clergy with the goal of bringing our campers closer to Christ and helping them gain a stronger mastery of our faith
- Liturgical Hour (LH) a session intended to help campers return to parishes with a better understanding of what's happening in liturgical services and to encourage them to participate
- Great Outdoors (GO) exploration of the beauty of the Prescott wilderness
- Arts and Crafts
- Athletics

Kids are also able to enjoy three hallmarks of our camping ministry:

- **Siesta** post-lunch down time in cabins to rest before the afternoon activities start up again
- Flex Time unstructured time for campers to work on arts and crafts, eat snacks, do a number of athletic activities, and enjoy free time doing whatever they choose
- **Devotionals** nightly cabin talks deepening relationships between campers and helping them understand more about their own relationships with Christ

Please note, spots are quickly filling up! If you were thinking about signing up your child for camp, now is the time! This year we also have a donations page to help with funding portions of our camping ministry - including sponsoring campers, bus transportation, and staff orientation, to name a few.
